THIS MONTH'S THEME Cozy Winter Senses

This month will ignite your child's sense of sight and sound as they hear and see the beauty of the winter months. They will make a drum, a ribbon wand for dancing and a pretend piano. The journey continues outside by hunting for sights and sounds in nature. Listen to the hoot of an owl, the crack of ice and ringing bells. Head inside to warm up and investigate familiar indoor sights and sounds. Hear a whistling teapot and the crunch of cookies. End the month by exploring light and dark during the short

winter days. What lights up the night sky and what makes shadows? A full, fun month of sensory exploration fills this theme.

Improving Transitions

A transition refers to any occurring change. Transitions can be stressful and frustrating for children who are either not ready to end their current activity or who struggle with change. Here are some ideas to help make transitions smoother for your child:

Give your child a preview. Prepare your child for transitions by alerting them of the upcoming change before it happens. The more your child can predict their routine, the smoother the day will flow.

Use music to ease transitions. Sing a favorite tune, changing the words to include your child's name and what needs to be done. Here's an example (sung to the tune of 'Row Your Boat'):

Clean, clean, clean the room Let's pick up the toys <u>Maggie</u> is going to have some lunch So let's clean up the room.

Introduce Movement Sticks.

Write movement words on craft sticks, such as "Jump like a frog," or "Hop on one foot." After your child has completed the desired task (e.g., putting away the blocks), encourage them to choose a craft stick and move in that way to the next activity (e.g. washing up for lunch).
